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## **The Tuberculosis Association of India**

### **Objects of the Association (as per Memorandum)**

- a) The prevention, control, treatment and relief of tuberculosis.

- i) The purchase or acquisition on lease or in exchange or by way of gift or otherwise of any real or personal or immovable or movable property and any rights or privileges necessary or convenient for its purposes.
- j) The sale, improvement, management and development of all or any part of the property and rights of the Association.
- k) The borrowing of money with or without security.
- l) The establishment and maintenance of Provident Funds or Pension Funds for the benefit of the employees of the Association.
- m) The undertaking of the Research and Investigation on subjects concerning tuberculosis and allied chest diseases.
- n) The doing of all such things as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of the above objects or any of them or which may be conveniently done along with or as subsidiary to the said objects.

## **FOREWORD BY CHAIRMAN TAI**

The Tuberculosis Association of India founded on 23<sup>rd</sup> February 1939 envisions a TB free India through collaborative efforts with Government of India, health care providers and NGOs in the healthcare sector for a healthier future for all.

The National Tuberculosis Elimination Programme (NTEP) a centrally sponsored programme under the National Health Mission of the Govt. of India seeks to achieve ambitious target of eliminating Tuberculosis in India by 2025, five years ahead of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs.). After the challenging years of pandemic in India, the total TB case notifications have surpassed the 2022 with a total TB case notification of 24.2 lakhs. In 2023, a total of 25.52 lakhs patients were notified out of whom 24.37 lakhs were put on treatment. The overall treatment success ratio of TB notified patients was 87.6 % in 2023, higher than previous year's achievement.

Under the NTEP, a multi-pronged strategy of door to door active case finding, bi-directional screening of TB and COVID, decentralization of TB diagnostics, partnership with health outreach workers and community volunteers for surveillance, and private sector engagement to help patients stick to treatment regimens.

The NTEP has deployed 6495 CBNAAT/True Nat machines across the country for rapid molecular diagnostics of TB which has ensured early and complete case finding and has reduced number of missing cases in India. The programme has also tried to address all co-morbidities and social determinants of the persons affected with TB. Adopting a patient-centric view, the programme also extends nutritional and travel support to TB patients across the country. Since 2018, direct benefit transfer (DBT) schemes, such as Nikshay Poshan Yojna, transport support for TB patients in notified tribal areas, honorarium for treatment supporters and incentive for private sector providers and informants have been launched and are operational.

The Pradhan Mantri TB Mukh Bharat Abhiyaan and Nikshay 2.0 was launched by the Hon'ble President of India on September 9, 2022, a unique intervention that captured global attention. Under the unique community led initiative, participation of more than 1.5 lakh Nikshay Mitra have committed to support 10 lakh TB patients and distributed more than 15.5 lakhs nutrition baskets, through individuals or through corporate entities registered online on the Nikshay platform.

TAI remains committed to reinforcing NTEP's mission through awareness, advocacy, and research-driven initiatives . Key contributions include:

- Prestigious publications like the Indian Journal of Tuberculosis
- Annual National Conference fostering knowledge exchange
- TB Seal Campaign for mass awareness
- Funding short-term research projects .
- Innovative TB Quiz competitions to engage youth in medical colleges.
- Educational pamphlets on TB risk factors (alcohol, smoking, diabetes, HIV)
- Leveraging social media and a dynamic website to highlight state-level TB initiatives

### **TAI's Role in Combating TB Stigma and Strengthening Elimination Efforts**

The year 2025 has been identified when intensified activities against stigma will be taken forward by TAI through its branches throughout India. Crucially, TAI has intensified its focus on reducing TB-associated stigma, a major barrier to early diagnosis and treatment adherence. Through targeted campaigns, community dialogues, and partnerships with influencers, we are working to dispel myths, encourage open conversations, and foster a supportive environment for TB survivors.

As we move closer to the 2025 elimination target, TAI remains steadfast in its mission to provide comprehensive support, education, and resources, ensuring equitable access to quality care, reducing transmission, intensified fight against stigma and ultimately, freeing India from the burden of TB.

## **ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING**

The Annual General Meeting of the Association was held on 16<sup>th</sup> March, 2024 at the Conference room, Tuberculosis Association of India 3 Red Cross Road, New Delhi physical and hybrid mode. Welcome Address was made by Prof. Dr. V.K. Arora, Chairman TAI. He informed the house about the major programmes undertaken in the years from 2021 to 2023 and the qualitative and quantitative changes taking place in the Association. Dr. V.M. Katoch President TAI chaired the meeting and addressed the members through online Echo platform. He emphasized the need to support the programmes of Govt. of India for control of TB. He endorsed the programmes of the Association to promote research activities, create mass awareness and giving Awards. He spoke of the need to strengthen programmes and activities of the State Associations. Chairman, TAI Dr. VK Arora presented the Annual report of the Association for the years 2020-21, 2021-22 and 2022-23. The audited accounts of the Association for the years 2020-21, 2021-22 and 2022-23 were presented. Awards and recognitions were also given to State TB Associations for activities and achievements for the years 2020, 2021, and 2022 and for sale of TB Seals during the 70<sup>th</sup>, 71<sup>st</sup> and 72<sup>nd</sup> Campaigns. The names of members elected to the Central Committee under Rule 3 (viii) of the Memorandum of Association were announced.

## **CENTRAL COMMITTEE MEETING**

The meeting of the Central Committee (Governing Body of the Association) was held on 27<sup>th</sup> January, 2024 at New Delhi. Dr. V.M. Katoch President TAI chaired the meeting and addressed the members through online Echo platform.

### Proceedings

The meeting confirmed the minutes of the Central Committee meeting held on 13<sup>th</sup> March, 2023. The Central Committee considered the following :-

- (i). Letter no. President Sectt. I.D. No.21002(03)/2/2023-CA (II) dated 02.01.2024 received on 03.01.2024 from President's Secretariat regarding dissociation of name of the President of India as Patron of Tuberculosis Association of India.
- (ii). Letter no Z-28015/231/2023-TB dated 26<sup>th</sup> December 2023 received from Central TB Division, MoHFW regarding Patronship of Tuberculosis Association of India.

- (iii). Letter dated 29<sup>th</sup> December 2023, received on 01.01.2024 received from Central TB Division, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare regarding inventory of assets of TAI.

The Central Committee members were apprised that information was sent to Central TB Division on the inventory of assets of the Association and the legal opinion taken on the dissociation of name of the President of India as Patron of Tuberculosis Association of India.

The Central Committee after detailed discussion of the Legal opinion obtained in the matter agreed unanimously to authorize the Association to convey the resolutions to President's Secretariat and the Under Secretary, Central TB Division, MoHFW.

Resolution-1 with reference to Central TB Division, MoHFW OM no.Z-28015/231/2023-TB dated 26/12/2023 addressed to Dy. Secretary (CA-II), President's Secretariat New Delhi, with copy to the Trustees of TAI:-

- i. "The points brought out in the letter dated 26.12.2023 from MOHFW have been noted.
- ii. No action of the part of TAI accrues or felt necessary as neither any incidence nor event has been cited or any action is necessitated on the part from TAI."

Resolution-2 with reference to President's Secretariat letter no.21002(03)/2/2023-CA(II) dated 2<sup>nd</sup> January 2024:-

1. "The Patron of TAI is a unifying guide and philosopher towards achieving the object of the Association and is very much required to remain as Patron in future too.
2. The Patron is humbly requested by the Central Committee to reconsider the decision so conveyed in the letter dated 2.1.2024 on this subject.
3. The Central Committee is pleased to pass this resolution unanimously in its meeting after considering all the aspects of the Memorandum and the past legacies including the formation of TAI in 1939 wherein Her Excellency Viceroy had agreed to be the President-ex-officio and later, President of India has been Patron-ex-officio and that position continues till date after passage of 84 years."

Other important decisions taken in the meeting are as under:-

- i. The minutes of the meeting of Finance Committees held on 19<sup>th</sup> September, 2023 were received with approval.

- ii. The Revised Estimates for the year 2023-24 and Budget Estimates for the year 2024-25 were approved by the Central Committee.
- iii. The Central Committee approved the Audited Accounts for the year 2022-23.
- iv. The existing members of the Finance Committee were appointed for the year 2024-25.
- v. The Central Committee agreed for continuance of the existing Management Committee of the New Delhi TB Centre for the year 2024-25.
- vi. It noted/approved the extension of service period/ engagement/ resignation of contractual personnel.
- vii. Dr. K.K. Chopra former Director NDTB Centre is designated as Consultant-TB in NDTB Centre, under TAI on completing age of 62 years.

## **FINANCE AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEES**

The joint meeting of the Finance and Executive Committee of the Association was held on 27<sup>th</sup> January 2024 at New Delhi. It considered and deliberated matters relating to day-to-day working of the Association , administrative, financial and other important matters.

It confirmed the minutes of the Finance Committee meeting of the Association held on 19<sup>th</sup> September, 2023. The revised Budget Estimates for 2023-24 and Budget Estimates of the Association for 2024-25 were recommended for approval of Central Committee. The Annual Report for the year 2020-21,2021-22 and 2022-23 were approved.

## **AUDITORS**

Messrs Thakur, Vaidyanath Aiyar and Co., Chartered Accountants, New Delhi were appointed as auditors for the year 2023-24 for Tuberculosis Association of India and New Delhi TB Centre respectively.

## **NEW DELHI TB CENTRE MANAGING COMMITTEE**

The Managing Committee of the New Delhi TB Centre met on 10th December 2023 to consider matters relating to the day-to-day working of the Centre, its administration and finances. The budget proposal for next financial year and Annual report of the Centre was discussed and approved. Also various issues related to staff and pending matters of NDTB Centre were discussed in the meeting.

## **INDIAN JOURNAL OF TUBERCULOSIS**

The Tuberculosis Association of India brings out a very prestigious quarterly – Indian Journal of Tuberculosis – in the months of January, April, July and October. This Journal is the official organ of the Tuberculosis Association of India. This is the only Indian technical medical journal exclusively devoted to tuberculosis.

Two Special issues of the Journal were published during the year on “Tuberculosis and Respiratory Diseases in Paediatric and in Adolescents” and “Multi Drug Resistance in Tuberculosis”. The Journal includes original articles, case reports, forum, abstracts, etc. of interest to doctors and students. It also publishes Orations and Guest Lectures presented at the National Conference on TB & Chest Diseases held under the aegis of the Association. Each issue of the Journal carries a quarterly report of TB Division of Ministry of Health and Family Welfare on the progress made in India by the Directly Observed Treatment - Short Course (DOTS) - based National Tuberculosis Control Programme. The articles published in the journal are frequently cited. Online access to the past issues of the Journal including Special Issues have has been provided in website <https://www.tbassn.org>.

It has, because of its meaningful contents, and get up, come up to match international standards. IJT is indexed in MEDLINE of National Library of Medicine, USA. It has a good reach among TB workers, institutions in the country and globally.

We are thankful to the contributors who have so painstakingly contributed their articles to the Journal. To make it reach globally we have entered into an agreement with M/s Elsevier for the printing, marketing and publication of the IJT.

## **SHORT TERM RESEARCH PROJECTS**

The Research Committee ensures and monitors series of comparative studies on various aspects of tuberculosis with the help of providing financial assistance. The Association also encourages conduct of scientific operational research studies to encourage medical students and Doctors to add to the knowledge base on Tuberculosis. The main consideration in selecting the candidates had been to enlist the interest of those in junior and middle level researchers who are doing some research and are interested in doing better research, so that scientifically more worthwhile results can be published and utilized.

During the year 9 Short term research projects were approved during 2023-24 and Rs.3.10 lakhs were sanctioned as grants.

## **ANNUAL NATIONAL CONFERENCES**

An important activity of the Association is the holding of the National Conference of Tuberculosis Workers every year generally in a State capital, on rotation basis, to enable them to keep abreast of latest developments and results of research studies. Around 400-600 delegates attend this Conference and scientific papers are presented, besides panel discussions, symposia and orations. The deliberations of the Conferences somewhat contribute to the National Tuberculosis Programme of the country also.

Apart from the scientific sessions, orations, etc important meetings of the various Committees of the Association are also held during the Conference. These include the meeting of the Standing Technical Committee, the Secretaries of State Associations and other meetings.

The 78th NATCON was held at Lulu International Convention Centre, Thrissur, Kerala from February 02, 03 and 04, 2024 and organized by Association of Pulmonologists, Thrissur and Academy of Pulmonary and Critical Care Medicine under the aegis of The Tuberculosis Association of India. The Conference theme was “ Robert Koch to Robotics”. Dr. N.K. Jain former Additional Principal / Professor and Head, Department of Chest and TB, SMS Medical College Jaipur was the President of the Conference.

It was a three day conference with first day dedicated to pre conference workshops. Ten workshops were conducted, in which hands on experience was given to post graduate students about various technologies used in Tuberculosis and Respiratory Diseases. These were attended resident by doctors and faculty in large numbers.

The Conference was attended by more than 700 delegates from all parts of India. Faculty included renowned Indian and overseas doctors. Highlights of the conference included presentation of the TAI Oration and other awards, panel discussions and debates on current topics in Tuberculosis and Respiratory diseases. “Meet the Expert” was another unique feature of this conference.

A major attraction was the First national Level PG quiz competition in collaboration with M/s Mankind Pharma as exclusive sponsor. All post graduate students of Respiratory medicine (MD/DM/DTCDD/DNB/Diploma) across India were allowed to register. In the preliminary round which was held online, around 600 PG medical students were registered. The semi final and final rounds were held at the Conference venue. Winners were given cash prizes.

In addition, meeting of Editorial Board, Indian Journal of Tuberculosis, State

Secretaries Technical meeting and South East Asia Regional UNION meeting were held on the sidelines of the NATCON.

## **TB SEAL CAMPAIGNS**

The TB seal campaigns are the mainstay of the Association and its affiliates and are one of the most important activities of the Association. These annual campaigns reflect the firm resolve and determination of the Association to combat tuberculosis.

These campaigns serve the objectives of bringing about awareness of the problem of tuberculosis in the country and raising funds for promoting and intensifying voluntary anti-TB work in the country. The campaigns aim is to elicit participation and cooperation of all sections of the Society to contribute to the fight against tuberculosis.

Through concerted efforts, the collections from TB seal campaigns are showing an upward trend in the recent years. More and more individuals, philanthropists, institutions compared with the past have still to come forward to help and assist in this noble cause.

The theme and designs for the seals are carefully chosen having universal view and appealing in nature every year.

The TB Seal Campaign which is inaugurated every year on 2nd of October, Gandhi Jayanti, by The President of India and in the States by the respective Hon'ble Governors/Chief Ministers of the State provides an excellent opportunity to the people to contribute towards the fight against tuberculosis by buying these seals, each costing Rupees Five only. Besides it helps to create awareness about the tuberculosis problem and the year's Theme shows the way about how to do it. Out of the TB Seal Campaign collections, 90% of the collection is retained with each State for promoting voluntary anti-tuberculosis activities. The Central Association's share is 10% being the contribution towards research fund of TAI and other logistics.

Chairman the Association, Prof. Dr. V.K.Arora inaugurated the 74<sup>th</sup> TB Seal Campaign at a function at New Delhi office on 2<sup>nd</sup> October, 2023. The Association brought out an E-Souvenir to mark the occasion.

In his message Chairman stated that it is a matter of pride that the Seal is being launched this year also on 2<sup>nd</sup> October which coincides with the birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi the Father of the Nation. He noted that the Association is well on its path of creating awareness to fight against TB and supplementing the

National TB Elimination Programme launched by Government of India.

Congratulatory messages to mark the occasion were received from Vice President of India, Lt. Governor of Delhi, President of the Association, members of the Central Committee, Director General Railway Health Service, Lt.Gen. Director General of Armed Forces Medical Service and Regional Director WHO South East Asia Region.

On the occasion of 74<sup>th</sup> TB Seal campaign, E-souvenir was released on the website of the Association <https://tbassnindia.org>. The Special Souvenir containing meaningful articles and inspiring and encouraging messages from the dignitaries is well received. The messages were befittingly utilized by our State affiliates in propagating the TB Seal Campaign in the States.

The Special Souvenir provided awareness on health education and helped to sustain the levels of sale of TB seals by propagating the TB Seal Campaign.

## **STATE TB ASSOCIATIONS**

There are thirty-one State TB Associations, which are affiliated to the Central Association. In addition, 365 districts in the country have District TB Associations and these are affiliated to their respective State Associations. The State and District Associations continued to play a significant role in educating the public on the various aspects of the disease and of the facilities provided under the National TB Elimination Programme (NTEP), in addition to their routine activities such as TB Seal Campaign, State-level Conferences. Some of the State Associations for some time now are not very vibrant. We have been taking corrective measures.

## **INTERNATIONAL UNION AGAINST TUBERCULOSIS AND LUNG DISEASE**

The Tuberculosis Association of India continued to work in close collaboration with the International Union Against Tuberculosis and Lung Disease, Paris, in all fields of activities. The Association contributes towards the Budget of the Union. Chairman had participated in its Annual Union World Conference held in Paris during 15-18 November, 2023 and also submitted our Seals for the year 2023 as entry for the Christmas Seals Contest.

## **ANNUAL AWARDS**

Every year at the Annual General Meeting, the Tuberculosis Association of India presents the following Shield/Trophies for excellent activities done by the States :

1. KHUSHI RAM SHIELD is awarded for excellent activities done during each year by a State Association.
2. THE BHAI MOHAN SINGH CUP is awarded for general activities and achievements by a State TB Association every year.
3. A Special Award for all round activities by a State TB Association and a Special Souvenir for consistently good performance and all round activities by a State TB Association.

The criteria for the above awards are the number of state level conference organized ; CME/Refresher Course held ; number of General Body/EC/CC/Technical Committee meetings held ; and number of active district TB Associations.

4. The TB Seal Trophy for the highest collections from the TB seal campaign is awarded to a State, who collects maximum.
5. The Runners-up Cup for the second best collections by a State TB Association
6. The Silver Cup for smaller States for highest collections by a smaller State/ Union Territory.
7. The Special TB Seal Awards for best collections by a smaller State/Union Territory.

1. DR. P.K. SEN-TAI GOLD MEDAL ORATION, instituted in honour of late Dr. P.K. Sen, to a senior TB worker who has made outstanding contribution to the cause of tuberculosis control in India. The Oration carries a Gold Medal and a Certificate.
2. Dr. S.P. Agarwal TAI ORATION is generally awarded to very senior/eminent scientists (for national and international doctors – age no bar) who have made notable contributions/researches in the basic disciplines underlying TB control such as epidemiologist, statistics, etc. The purpose is to acknowledge and give recognition to their contribution and excellence in the field of tuberculosis. The Oration carries a Silver Medal and Certificate.
3. Sardari Lal Dr. Vijay Kumar Arora TAI ORATION is awarded to a person who has made outstanding scientific contributions in the field of TB control , particularly on clinical, operational, sociological, managerial etc aspects or in a field having a vital bearing on them. This Oration carries a cash award of Rs. 15,000/- and Certificate.
4. CHARU CHANDRA DAS MEMORIAL AWARD, is awarded to a person, not more than 45 years in age, who has rendered meritorious service in any field of tuberculosis. The award carries a certificate of honor and Rs.25,000/- in cash.

### **THE NEW DELHI TUBERCULOSIS CENTRE**

In 1940 the Tuberculosis Association of India and Government of India set up jointly the New Delhi Tuberculosis Centre as a model clinic. In 1951, The New Delhi TB Centre (NDTB Centre) was upgraded to be the first Demonstration cum Training Centre with the assistance of WHO, UNICEF and Govt. of India. In 1966, the Centre became a referral Centre for TB patients from all parts of the country who could avail diagnostic and treatment facilities. It is an apex institute

recognized well for the diagnosis, treatment, training, teaching and research in the field of TB and Respiratory Diseases. The Centre was designated as STDC for the state of Delhi in the year 2005. Since then the Centre has been imparting training and retraining facilities to the medical and paramedical staff of the 25 Chest Clinics under RNTCP.

With the objective of expansion of quality DOTS services to the entire country, the Centre continues to render the services in the field of TB and Respiratory diseases. The Centre aims at widening sources both in terms of activities and access, and to sustain the achievements for decades to come in order to achieve ultimate objectives of TB control in the country.

The Centre actively works in liaison with State TB Cell on getting positive results for all components of a new Stop TB Strategy. As an IRL the institute assists RNTCP in maintaining the global standards through quality assurance for the lab in state. The Institute has been a guiding force in formulating policy in relation to involvement of Private sector and Medical Colleges in the programme for the management of paediatric TB and operational research.

At present, the institute has following activities:

- Referral OPD services for TB and Allied diseases patients.
- Special Clinics for TB and Diabetes, TB and HIV, COAD and Tobacco cessation clinic
- State TB Training and Demonstration Centre related activities
- Intermediate Reference Laboratory activities.
- Research in the field of TB and Respiratory Diseases

Teaching and Training at New Delhi TB Centre

1. The Centre teach PG students, Intern and MBBS
2. The Centre teaches interns in Bio-statistics.
3. The Centre gives sensitization, training on tuberculosis nursing and RNTCP.
4. The Centre gives training to medical and para-medical students.

Clinical Section is providing diagnostic and treatment services for TB and respiratory diseases. Patients are referred from all parts of Delhi and surrounding States.

Laboratory of the Centre is equipped with all diagnostic facilities starting from microscopy to whole genome sequencing. In addition, laboratory facility is being used for teaching and training of medical and para medical staff. A number of research projects are being conducted. During the year, a total of 28,434 patients attended the OPD for diagnosis and treatment of TB, and more than 70,000 laboratory examinations were carried out to support the diagnosis for cases referred from 17 Chest Clinics of Delhi State. This laboratory is accredited by NABL.

Training section of the Centre trained 3716 personnel during the year. ECHO platform is also being used for training and programme review purposes. Efforts are on to make use of e-module and frequent use of ECHO platform so as the time and POL for personally attending the training and review sessions.

The faculty of the Centre is actively involved in conducting research activities in clinical, bacteriological and programme related aspects.

### **ANTI-TB WEEK**

The Tuberculosis Association of India observed Anti-TB week from 17th to 23rd February. During the week, health education materials on tuberculosis were displayed for creating awareness among the general public.

### **WORLD TB DAY**

World Tuberculosis Day, falling on March 24 each year, is designed to build public awareness about the global epidemic of tuberculosis (TB) and efforts to eliminate the disease. This annual event commemorates the day in 1882 when Dr. Robert Koch announced his discovery of Mycobacterium tuberculosis, the bacillus that causes TB.

The State TB Associations celebrated the World TB Day in their respective states.

### **HEALTH EDUCATION**

The foremost activity of the Tuberculosis Association of India is health education of the people. Social media posts, new updated pamphlets on TB and their link with diabetes, HIV and Smoking, special souvenirs, etc. were brought out during the year. These are distributed freely in the States in their local languages to reach the people, educating them about the symptoms suggestive of tuberculosis, importance of early diagnosis, principles underlying proper treatment and other preventive steps which could be taken. Films shows and health education stalls in exhibitions and melas were also organised by State Associations to sensitize people on treatment of TB.

## **MEMBERSHIP**

Under Rule 3(ix) read with bye-laws 17(a) and (b) of the Tuberculosis Association of India Rules, each State Association nominates one member on our Central Committee and can attend meeting of the Central Committee. He is also entitled to vote at the Annual General Meeting, receive a copy of the annual statement of accounts and Annual Report of the Association.

## **DONATIONS**

The Association received a sum of Rs.1,91,200/- as donations and contributions towards its activities during 2023-24.

The Association records its deep sense of gratitude to all the donors for their contributions, assistance and support.

## **REPORT ON WORKING OF NEW DELHI TB CENTRE**

The New Delhi Tuberculosis Centre, since its inception in 1940, has played a vital role in the fight against tuberculosis under the able guidance of TB Association of India. The Centre has been a cornerstone in the National Tuberculosis Elimination Programme (NTEP), providing invaluable advice and guidance. The New Delhi Tuberculosis Centre continues to be a beacon of excellence in the fight against tuberculosis. The Centre is involved in different activities like teaching, training, research, and patient care and determines to achieve the national goal of tuberculosis elimination.

It is not only a referral Centre for TB and Respiratory Disease but also functions as State TB Training and Demonstration Centre and Intermediate Reference Laboratory for Delhi State, monitoring NTEP activities of the microscopy Centres under 25 Chest Clinics of Delhi.

During the year, a total of 28,434 patients attended the OPD for diagnosis and treatment of TB, and more than 70,000 laboratory examinations were carried out to support the diagnosis for cases referred from 17 Chest Clinics of Delhi State.

The quality assured lab designated as IRL continued to make rapid strides this year as well. The laboratory is equipped with all TB diagnostics, from microscopy to Gene sequencing. During the year, IRL excelled in ensuring the quality assurance of sputum microscopy, as in the previous years. Currently, culture and DST are being performed on samples coming from chest clinics for the diagnosis and follow up of drug resistant cases. Functioning as an Intermediate Reference Laboratory (IRL) under NTEP, the Centre provides diagnostic support to Delhi state through line probe assay and liquid culture DST for first line and second line anti TB drugs. The Centre also provides EQA support for smear microscopy and coordinates with NRL for NAAT EQA activities.

Laboratory of the Centre has been working as BSL- III Laboratory. During the year, Central TB Division, Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, Govt. of India, has sanctioned up-gradation of this Laboratory for the purpose of better diagnostic facilities under NTEP. Intermediate Reference Laboratory of this centre which is also an ISO15189:2012 NABL accredited lab is being selected as a part of ICMR- TB diagnostics validation network. Few labs of the country are part of this network which will be involved as a resource laboratory for indigenous development of TB diagnostics. Laboratory of this centre continuously being a favourite site for providing support for multicentric clinical trials (both national and international)/ kit validation/ validation of new diagnostic modalities, etc. These

studies have been supported/ funded by CTD, ICMR, FIND, UNION, MRC – London, etc.

The Centre is entrusted with the training and retraining of all the categories of staff of National TB Elimination Programme including doctors. In all, 3716 Medical and Para Medical personnel were sensitized to NTEP. The teaching and training activities include the training of Maulana Azad Medical College undergraduates and interns in tuberculosis as well as postgraduate MD and DTCD students of VP Chest Institute, Delhi University posted as part of their training curriculum.

Active case finding (ACF) has been a major operational research activity of our Centre. In addition to ACF in already identified vulnerable population. This year, also we contributed ACF in homeless pavement dwellers in Sangam Vihar and Chandini Chowk area with the help of mobile X-ray van supported by Medanta Medicity, Gurugram.

### **Research Projects**

#### **1. Non-tuberculous mycobacterial (NTM) disease study:**

The laboratory of this Centre is a part of a multicentric study entitled "Prevalence, risk factors and laboratory diagnosis of non- tuberculous mycobacterial (NTM) disease: a multicentre study". Six different sites from various regions of the country are being involved in this study. This research is funded by Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), New Delhi. The study is in progress. Patient enrollment has been completed. Data compilation, patient's treatment and their progress is being followed up. The project has following objectives:

1. To determine the prevalence of NTM disease among TB suspects in Delhi, Chandigarh, Wardha, Ahmadabad and Tirupati regions

2. To study various risk factors of NTM disease
3. To characterize species and sub species of confirmed NTM isolates
4. To perform drug susceptibility testing (DST) of speciated NTM isolates
5. Clinical, microbiological and radiological follow-up of the confirmed NTM disease patients
6. To do cost-effective analysis of various lab techniques used for the diagnosis of NTM disease.

## **2. Short intensified treatment for children with tuberculosis meningitis (SURE)**

Laboratory of this Centre is a part of clinical trial entitled “Short intensified treatment for children with tuberculosis meningitis (SURE)”. This study is being funded by MRC London, UK aid, & National Institute of Health Research. Study is a phase III, multi-centre, international, partially- blinded factorial randomised controlled trial of TBM treatment in children. Trial is being carried out in five different countries. Patient enrolment, treatment, follow-up and data base management is being done at Kalawati Saran Children Hospital, New Delhi and laboratory

support is being provided by IRL, New Delhi TB Centre. Currently this study is under progress and has following objectives:

1. To determine whether the standard 12 month ATT regimen for treating paediatric TBM can be reduced to 6 months with similar efficacy and safety, with an intensified regimen of anti-TB drugs in children aged 29 days and under 18 years with TBM.
2. To determine whether adjunctive aspirin for the first 60 days of treatment reduces TBM-related neuro-disability with minimal or no toxicity in children with TBM.
3. To determine whether the doses of anti-TB drugs, prescribed according to weight bands, result in appropriate drug exposures when compared with historical paediatric and adult PK data.
4. To further understand the pathophysiology of TBM in children and the effects of intensified anti-bacterial and anti-inflammatory treatment on intra-cerebral inflammation and the macroscopic complications of TBM (infarcts, tuberculomas, hydrocephalus).

### **3. Assessment of effectiveness of the 4-month Moxifloxacin containing daily regimen in the treatment of microbiologically confirmed new pulmonary tuberculosis patients.**

A multicentric randomised clinical trial which is funded by National Institute of Research in Tuberculosis (NIRT), Chennai is being laboratory supported by IRL, NDTB Centre. Enrolment of patient, treatment and there follow-up for treatment adherence is being done at TB Chest clinic, Lok Nayak Hospital, New Delhi. Study is in progress with following objectives:

#### **Primary objective**

To assess whether the 4-month Moxifloxacin containing daily regimen is non-inferior to the standard 6 month daily regimen in the treatment of microbiologically confirmed new pulmonary TB.

#### **Secondary objectives**

To compare the following between the test and the control regimens

1. Adverse drug reactions (ADR).
2. Sputum culture conversion at the end of intensive phase of treatment.
3. Cost-effectiveness of treatment of TB.
4. Intake of participants and is complete and follow up of enrolled patients is going on.

## **ACTIVITES OF CLINICAL SECTION**

New Delhi Tuberculosis Centre was started in 1940 and was established as a benchmark for TB clinics in the country. Clinical Department is committed to providing high quality care for patients with TB. It is a referral centre for all difficult and complicated TB cases, catering to Delhi NCR and neighbouring states.

Apart from TB cases, all other respiratory conditions are also managed, majority of which include Bronchial Asthma, COPD, pneumonia, Bronchiectasis, ILD etc. The Clinical OPD runs six days a week, along with the radiology department and pharmacy.

The Live Computerized Tel Screening System (LCTS) was set up in 2022. It has greatly facilitated the functioning of the OPD, allowing instant image of the patient. Not only has it made major difference in Pulmonary TB case management, it has greatly impacted cases referred from other specialties, including pediatrics, dermatology and ophthalmology for expert opinion.

With the LCTS in place, primary TB disease (hilar lymph nodes, minimal pleural effusion) is being diagnosed very early. The LCTS allows for brighter and contrast adjustments which significantly influences the diagnosis. The need for referring patients for further imaging (including ultrasounds, CT Scans) has reduced significantly, thereby saving a lot of time and financial burden on patients.

## **HIGHLIGHTS OF ACTIVITIES OF STATES**

### **THE TUBERCULOSIS ASSOCIATION OF ANDHRA PRADESH**

The Tuberculosis Association of Andhra Pradesh has organized the Inaugural function of the 74th TB Seal Sale Campaign on Tuesday, the 14th November, 2023 at 11.00 A.M., at Raj Bhavan, Vijayawada. Shri Justice S. Abdul Nazeer, Hon'ble Governor of Andhra Pradesh and the President of the Association was the Chief Guest of the day. He has inaugurated the TB Seal Sale Campaign and distributed the Awards to the winners.

The TB Association of Andhra Pradesh has transferred a sum of Rs.40,000/- @ Rs.10,000/- each to Konaseema Institute of Medical Sciences and Research Foundation, Amalapuram, Kurnool Medical College, Viswabharathi Medical College, Kurnool , Ongole Medical College, Ongole for conducting CME Programmes.

The TB Association of Andhra Pradesh has released an amount of Rs.3,45,000/- (Rupees Three Lakhs and Forty Five Thousand only) towards financial Assistance to 690 Poor MDR TB, HIV and XDRTB Patients @ Rs.500/- each from October 2023 to March, 2024.

The Association has transferred a sum of Rs.80,000/- for organizing Anti-TB Day, Anti-TB Week and World TB Day Celebrations from 17th to 23rd February, 2024 and World TB Day on 24th March, 2024 to the following districts for holding mass awareness programmes on TB such as Rallies, Public meetings, Health Check-up camps, Health Education Programmes, Film Shows, Exhibitions.

#### **i) Srikakulam District TB Association:**

On 24th March, 2024 the World TB Day was organized by Dr.Anuradha, District TB Control Officer, Srikakulam and DM&HO has organized Public Awareness Camps, Rallies, Health Education Camps, etc., in the places of Treatment Unit Gujarathipet, Treatment Unit Hera, Treatment Unit Mandasa, under aegis of the TB Association of Andhra Pradesh and the Srikakulam District TB Association.

#### **ii) Kurnool District TB Association:**

On the occasion of the World TB Day, Rally was conducted with 500 Participants. Public Meetings conducted with Nursing Colleges, Government Junior Colleges, and Schools regarding TB awareness Programme. Quiz

Programme was conducted at Government & Private Medical colleges and Prizes distributed to Post Graduate Students, Doctors and Nursing Students.

**iii) Dr.B.R.Ambedkar Konaseema District TB Association:**

Rally was conducted with 300 paramedical staff using display cards and banners and distributed refreshments to them. Printing and distribution of pamphlets to the public for awareness of TB.

**v) Kakinada District:**

Distributed pamphlets to the public and students in Schools and colleges.

**BIHAR TUBERCULOSIS ASSOCIATION**

The State Association is providing support to TB patients including nutritional, diagnosis and vocational support. It is consistently engaged in increasing mass awareness, control and treatment of TB and engaged in supplementing the Govt's efforts in this field.

The following activities were organized during the period :-

1 <sup>st</sup> August 2023	TB Awareness Programme at the International School, Patna. Students and teachers actively participated in the session. Information was given on various aspects of TB prevention and control.

29 <sup>th</sup> October, 2023	The AGM of the State Association was held. The office bearers of the Executive Committee were elected at the meeting. Shri UN Vidyarthi was elected Chairman of the State Association.

The Association organized the 5<sup>th</sup> State Conference on TB and Chest Diseases in collaboration with the All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) Patna and the Indira Gandhi Institute of Medical Sciences (IGIMS) Patna who are leading health care providers in Bihar. The Conference was inaugurated by Shri Samrat Chaudhary Hon. Deputy CM and Minister of Health & FW. Shri Vijay Kumar

Chaudhary, Hon. Minister of Education was Chief Guest at the Conference. Around 250 delegates across the State including Chest specialists, Physicians, senior doctors, PG Students and para-medical workers and social activists participated. Hon. Dy.CM assured all possible support to achieve the target of TB free India by 2025. Dr BK Mishra State TB Officer was associated closely with the Conference.

## **DELHI TUBERCULOSIS ASSOCIATION**

Delhi Tuberculosis Association (DTBA) has completed 84 years of voluntary service; its activities mainly focuses on prevention and control of tuberculosis. DTBA as a Mother NGO coordinates with other local NGOs working in the field of TB, under NTEP in Delhi.

It is providing comprehensive TB care services under NTEP at their doorstep in collaboration with Lok Nayak Chest Clinic. During the year under report , 161 homeless TB patients have been registered and put on treatment. Their main activity is the detection and treatment of TB through Mobile DOT Centre for homeless/pavement dwellers at Chandini Chowk and night shelter inmates of Delhi's walled city area.

They have a functioning DMC cum DOT Centre (PHI) at DTBA premises at 9-Institutional Area, Lodhi Road, New Delhi-110 003 under NDMC Chest Clinic (New Delhi Dist.) having free facility for TB specialist medical consultation, diagnosis of TB, Diabetes, HIV and counseling etc covering the entire Lodhi Road and adjoining areas. During the year under report 185 TB patients have been registered and put on treatment.

It organizes a Forum/Club of TB patients of DMC cum DOT Centre at DTBA premises including their family members and friends. Also arranges their frequent get-together and Patient Provider Assembly (PPA)- an interactive session by the Health Providers and Patients and their family members to assess their treatment progress, any Adverse Drug Reaction (ADR), weight gain/loss, food habits, holistic approach for regular and complete treatment and family support etc.

### **TB Harega Desh Jeetega Campaign:**

Being a stake holder of NTEP, DTBA's advocacy initiative to accelerate Pradhan Mantri TB Mukta Bharat Abhiyaan (PM - TB MBA) in the National Capital Territory of Delhi for Collective Action to End TB by 2025 with a message "Coming Together to END TB Altogether".

### **Assistance to TB patients:**

Providing Food Kit on a monthly basis for Rs.700/- to poor and needy TB patients taking treatment from PHI, DTBA with the support of “NIKSHAY MITRA”.

TB Forum: “Community Outreach Advocacy Group (COAG)”-

Students Engagement for people centered and community led TB Response Project.

## Communicable Diseases at Nallakunta ,Hyderabad.

- The Hyderabad District TB Association is providing Nutritional Support to 5 TB Patients at Sir Ronald Ross Institute of Tropical and Communicable Diseases, Nallakunta, Hyderabad with consultation of the Joint Director (TB) & State TB Control Officer, Govt. of Telangana.
- The TB Association of Telangana has released a sum of Rs.10,000/- to the District Medical and Health Officer, Peddapally and Rs.10,000/- to the District TB Control Officer, Ranga Reddy District towards organisation of Anti TB Week from 17<sup>th</sup> to 23<sup>rd</sup>. February 2024 and World TB Day on 24<sup>th</sup> March, 2024 in their Districts.
- The Association of Telangana has incurred an Expenditure of Rs.3,19,417/- towards providing of Nutritional Support to 116 MDR TB Patients under Pradhan Mantri TB Mukta Bharat Abhiyaan in the districts of Ranga Reddy and Medical – Malkajgiri from May, 2023 to February, 2024.

- Providing Financial Assistance of Rs.17,000/- every month to a Lab Technician in the ACF Mobile Van for the purpose of screening of TB Cases in rural areas under the Control of Joint Director (TB) & State TB Control Officer, Govt. of Telangana.
- The TB Association of Telangana has spent a sum of Rs.24,780/- towards Annual Maintenance charges for the EPSILON 2.4 KW Portable HF X-Ray Machine which was donated and installed in the ACF Mobile Van under the control of Joint Director’s Office, Govt. of Telangana.

### **MAHARASHTRA STATE ANTI TB ASSOCIATION**

A Pulmonary Rehabilitation Centre was started at our premises at Sewri in September 2016 and the program is conducted by trained physiotherapists. Activities at the Center have been stopped since the nationwide lockdown in March 2020. The PRC equipment has been donated to the Group of TB Hospital, Sewri, so that the services can be availed by a wider section of patients.

Our advocacy has resulted in the program being incorporated in the recently published Indian Guidelines for management of drug-resistant TB (2021).

NTEP and NHM has started PRCs in districts such as Mumbai, Amravati, Kolhapur under technical support from our Association. The Association envisages establishing PRCs in every district of the state in a phased manner. We support equipment and training of physiotherapists of all the PRCs.

Conducted training of the physiotherapist from these centers in collaboration with PT School & Center Sheth GS Medical College, KEMH and the Society of Cardiovascular and Pulmonary Rehabilitation.

Providing nutrition support to 200 TB patients under the NIKSHAY Mitra program on treatment in the suburbs of Mumbai on an ongoing monthly basis. This program has been in place since 2022 when the program was initiated by NTEP and being operational with the help of local NGOs.

Supported operational research project by the Foundation for Medical Research entitled Long-term follow up of contacts of DRTB cases in Mumbai. The findings have been published in Indian Journal of Tuberculosis.

74<sup>th</sup> TB Seal Campaign was launched on 2<sup>nd</sup> Oct, 2023. Chief gust of the function was Chairman Bharat Seva Sansthan.

TB Awareness programme was organized on 24<sup>th</sup> March 2023 at Lokbandhu Raj Narain Inter College Uttardhauna, Lko.

The total number of patients attended clinic was 22,890 in the FY 2023-24. It conducted 3263 pathology tests in the above period.





#### **Significant Accounting Policies & Notes to Accounts for the Year ended.**

##### **A. Significant Accounting Policies:**

###### **1. Background:**

The Tuberculosis Association of India is a Society registered under Societies Registration Act 1860 and Exemption, u/s 12A of Income Tax Act 1961, has been granted. Further, Exemption u/s 80G of the Income Tax Act 1961 have also been granted by the Income Tax Department.

###### **2. Accounting Convention:**

The Financial Statements have been prepared on accrual basis (except as specifically stated) and under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles in India.

###### **3. Use of Estimates:**

The preparation of the Financial Statements in conformity with GAAP in India requires management to make estimates and assumptions, wherever necessary, that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and contingent liabilities as at the date of financial statements and the amount of revenue and expenses during the year. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Any revision to such estimates is recognized in the year in which the results are known /materialized.

###### **4. Revenue recognition:**

Income including Grants and Expenditure are accounted for on “Accrual” basis.

###### **5. Tuberculosis Seal Campaign:**

Association collects @ 5% share of net collections made from Tuberculosis Seal Campaign from the States Association and credited to Income & Expenditure Account. Further, additional 2% share of net collections made from said campaign is credited to Research Fund. This shares of Tuberculosis Seal Campaign are accounted for on the basis of collection report submitted by the State Association.

**6. Property Plant & equipment & Depreciation:**

- i. Property Plant & Equipment (PPE) are valued at cost less depreciation on written down value method.
- ii. Depreciation is charged on PPE on following rates as decided by management:

- iii. Lease hold land is not depreciated over the period lease.

**7. Physical Verification:**

Physical verification of Fixed Assets is carried out once in every two years.

**8. Investments:**

Investments are stated at Cost.

**9. Provident fund:**

Association contributes towards Employees' Provident Fund Scheme 1925 in respect of regular employees @ 10% of basic and dearness allowance to the TAI Employees' Provident Fund. An equal subscription is also made by employees. However, Employees are allowed to contribute voluntarily up to 90% of their Basic and Dearness Allowance.

**10. Gratuity Fund:**

Association contributes under "Gratuity Fund" maintained by the Association towards gratuity liabilities of the Association. The contribution by association is made on estimated basis and interest earned on corresponding earmarked Investment is also credited to such Fund. The Gratuity Fund represented towards liabilities of Association's employees as well as employees of New Delhi TB Centre.

However, now from 01.04.2022 onwards, “New Delhi TB Centre” has started maintaining Gratuity Fund its own. Therefore, the fund lying with TAI till 31.03.2022 against employees of NDTB has been transferred by TAI to NDTB including the remaining balances amounting Rs 13,23133/- has been transferred during the year.

Now, there is a NIL balance as on 31-03-2024 with TAI against Gratuity Fund of NDTB.

## **11. Leave Encashment:**

Leave Encashment are being accounted for on Cash basis.

## **B. Notes to the Accounts:**

### **1. Contingent Liabilities:**

- i. NDMC vide its bill dated 22.05.2023 raised a demand of Rs. 57.88 lakh against property tax for two years, however, management of TAI had disputed the demand as the tenant had already been vacated the portion of the building let out earlier and the said fact has not been considered by the NDMC while calculating the demand against Property Tax. Hence, liability for the same has not been provided for. However, Rs.3.30 lakh has been paid by the Association on 9th November 2023 as per calculation made by its own.
- ii. For the Asst. year 2021-22, Income Tax Department has raised a Tax demand of Rs. 80.67 lakhs by disallowing the total expenditure / application of fund as claimed in the ITR by Association. However, on submission of the application u/s 154 of the IT Act, Department has made the rectification vide its order u/s 154 dated 29.05.2024 and demand has been dropped.
- iii. Further, a demand of Rs. 26,270 is also pending for the Asst Year 2019-2020 u/s Sec 143 (1) of the IT Act as per intimation order dated 14-08-2020, for which no liability has been provided as in the opinion of Management this Demand will also be rectified by the Income Tax Department.
- iv. Five ex-employees / retired employees of the Association had filed writ petition (WP (C) no.11234 of 2018 Sachin Srivastava & others) before the High Court of Delhi, for restoration of Dearness Allowance w.e.f. 01.04.2014 and also implementation of 7th Pay Commission

w.e.f. 01.01.2016. Since, the cases are still pending in the High Court, hence liabilities against the same has not been provided for.

2. Association has filed civil suits in TIS Hazari Court, against two of its ex employees viz. Mr. P. S. Chauhan and Mr. Sachin Srivastava as they are neither vacating the residential premises of the association nor paying the Rent. The accommodation was allotted by the Association during their employment with TAI, however, even after retirement, they are not vacating the premises. Thus, as a result of this, the proposed major renovation of the said building has not yet been started. The case is pending before TIS Hazari Court.
3. Association has changed its policy during the year for charging depreciation on computer from 60% to 40%. As a result, in comparison to previous year, the depreciation for the year is lower by Rs.5,186.10 consequently, income for the year is higher by the same amount.
4. Receivable & Payables are under process of confirmation.
5. Physical stock of T B Seal Campaign is maintained with Tuberculosis Association of India. Similarly, record/stock of T B seals supplied to other associations every year is to be maintained by the respective affiliated T B Associations.
6. Management is in the process of physical verification of the fixed assets of the Association and on completion of physical verification & its reconciliation with book balances, adjustment entries, if required in this regard will be made in the year of completion of such exercise.
7. Previous year's figures have been regrouped / rearranged wherever considered necessary.

### **Schedule No - 5**

#### **Significant Accounting Policies & Notes to Accounts**

##### **A. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

###### **1. General:**

Provident Fund Trust is governed by the provisions of Employee's Provident Fund Act, 1925. The Fund includes employees of New Delhi T B center also.

###### **2. Basis of Presentation:**

The Financial Statements have been prepared using historical cost convention and based on going concern. Revenue is recognized and expenses are accounted for on accrual basis.

###### **3. Investments:**

Surplus Funds is Invested by the Trust in the Govt. Securities, /Fixed Deposits with Banks. Investments are carried out at cost.

###### **4. Subscription and Contribution to Provident Fund:**

employees and employer contribute @10% of Basic Pay and Dearness allowance equally to Provident Fund. However, employees contributing voluntarily to such fund up to 90% of their basic salary & dearness allowance.

###### **5. Rate of Interest:**

Total Interest earned by the trust on investment during the year allocated to the members at the year-end based on the interest rate arrived at dividing the Net interest earned by average accumulated members balance and multiplied by 100.

###### **6. Interest to Members Balances:**

Interest on employer's contribution and employees' subscription is being allocated on the monthly average of accumulated balance during the year i.e., total cumulative balance divided by twelve and multiplied by rate of interest.

**B. NOTES TO ACCOUNTS:**

1. Balances of Ceased Members:

Old ceased members are pending for settlement amounting Rs.11,121.50 since last 20 years, as the same was not claimed by the member.

2. TAI receives Subscriptions and Contribution from New Delhi TB Centre and remit the same to the Fund.

### Significant Accounting Policies and Notes to Accounts

#### **A. Significant Accounting Policies:**

##### **1. Accounting Convention :**

The Financial Statements have been prepared on accrual basis (except as specifically stated) and under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles in India.

##### **2. Use of Estimates:**

The preparation of the Financial Statements in conformity with GAAP in India requires management to make estimates and assumptions, wherever necessary, that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and contingent liabilities as at the date of financial statements and the amount of revenue and expenses during the year. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Any revision to such estimates is recognized in the year in which the results are known / materialized.

##### **3. Revenue Recognition:**

Income & Expenditures have been accounted for on accrual basis except for leave encasement.

##### **4. Fixed Assets & Depreciation:**

- a) Fixed Assets are stated at cost, Assets received as donation are stated at estimated market value on the date of donation.
- b) Centre has started charging Depreciation from the Financial Year 2011-12 on its Fixed Assets as per rate prescribed under Income Tax Act, 1961.
- c) Further, Depreciation has been debited to the Assets Fund by Crediting Cost of respective Fixed Assets.
- d) Capital items having cost / value less than Rupees Five Thousand are not capitalized.
- e) Assets Fund has been credited with the cost/value of Fixed Assets acquired during the year by debiting Income & Expenditure account and / or Project Fund.

## **5. Inventories:**

Laboratory stains, chemicals and glassware and x-ray films & chemicals are valued at purchase price following FIFO method.

## **6. Gratuity :**

Provision towards gratuity liability is being made on adhoc basis (as per the rules of Tuberculosis Association of India) and the said fund is maintained by Tuberculosis Association of India. However from Financial Year 2019-20 onwards the said fund is maintained by the Centre. Therefore, the fund lying with the Tuberculosis Association of India has been transferred to Centre for maintenance of Gratuity fund its own.

## **7. Provident Fund :**

As per rules of Tuberculosis Association of India (TAI), accounts relating to Provident Fund of the staff of the Centre have been maintained by the (TAI) and members' & employer's contribution are being remitted to TAI.

## **8. Interest Incomes :**

Interests earned on the Investments of Earmarked Funds have been credited directly to such Fund instead of Income & expenditure Account.

## **B. Notes to Accounts**

1. In absence of any demands by the Lok Nayak Hospital for water expenses and for electricity charges from May 2018 onwards no liabilities have been provided for.
2. TDS recoverable as on 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2024 amounting to Rs. 8,18,300/- for which management is making effort to recover the same from the Tax Department.
3. Title deed of the land on which Buildings are situated is not available.
4. Cost / Value of stock are as valued and verified by the Management.
5. As per Letter from Ministry of Health & Family welfare, Government of India bearing file no. W.11034/02/2020-CCD dated 28<sup>th</sup> January 2021 and according to GFR, Interest received on the Grants from Government should be refunded and any un-spent balances of Grants should not be adjusted with future Grants.

6. Previous year's figures have been regrouped / rearranged wherever considered necessary.
